Criminal Cases Review Commission

Thank you for your letter regarding the Sydney Institute of Criminology's calls for Australian governments to establish a Criminal Cases Review Commission (CCRC), noting the recent pardon and release from custody of Kathleen Folbigg.

The Law Society, in principle, supports the establishment of a CCRC. We recognise that the criminal justice system carries a risk of wrongful conviction, and that wrongful convictions can have severe consequences, both for the individual accused and in affecting public confidence in the criminal justice system more broadly. A well-resourced and properly funded CCRC could act to safeguard rights and mitigate the negative impacts of a wrongful conviction.

We also note that establishing a CCRC is not a novel idea, with other comparable jurisdictions internationally having established CCRCs, including England and New Zealand. The international experience of CCRC models may well provide a basis to develop an appropriate and workable system of post-appellate investigation and assessment in Australia.

In developing a CCRC, we would support an approach that builds on lessons learnt from previous efforts developed in NSW in relation to wrongful convictions, including the Innocence Panel and the DNA Panel. We also suggest that close consideration should be given to how the CCRC would interact with existing appeal mechanisms, including Part 7 of the Crimes (Appeal and Review) Act 2001.

We look forward to opportunities to contribute to potential reform that considers the establishment of a CCRC in Australia.
